Critical thinking is the weighing of competing ideas and to balance a spectrum of ideas requires tolerance. Disagree with someone is OK, but to do so in a disrespectful and disorderly fashion is not. Personal insults and disparagement do not contribute to substantive ideas and constructive problem solving. There is no place in our society for the hate that was recently displayed so tragically in Charlottesville, Virginia.

Among the qualities we try to foster here is a respect for self and for others. Your reputation is something that needs to be nurtured and protected and during your time here we will try to ensure that you develop this to the fullest extent. You have chosen a college with a fine reputation which has been made possible by all of the alumni who precede you. Throughout the world, Maine Maritime Academy is known for the excellence of its graduates. These qualities make you highly sought-after in the industries we serve and it is my sincere hope that you will continue our great heritage and uphold our superb reputation.

And so, I ask you to maintain these standards through honor, courage and commitment; through altruism, compassion, friendship and tolerance. And above all, I urge you to conduct yourselves with civility – a basic decency - in your classrooms, your personal communications, and in your collective discussions. I ask also that you are ever mindful of the fact that your actions leave an indelible impression. Think carefully before you encroach on someone else's personal boundaries and respect yourself.
