ACADEMIC CALENDAR

Curious to know all the important dates during the course of the academic year? MMA's 2025-2026 academic calendar can be found on our website by searching "Academic Calendar" - or by clicking this link. The academic calendar includes dates such as the last day to add/drop a class or withdraw from a course, long weekends and break weeks, and class registration for the following semester.



CURTIS HALL CLOSINGS FOR BREAKS

During break periods, Curtis Hall closes to all students, except those who are participating in in-season sports, or standing paid watch on TSSOM. Below are some Q&As about Curtis Hall break closings.

Q: To help me plan ahead now, when will Curtis Hall be closed during the upcoming academic year?

A: Thanksgiving Break: Closes Friday, November 21, 2025 @ 5PM & reopens Sunday, November 30, 2025 @ 1PM. Winter Break: Closes Friday, December 12, 2025 @ 5PM & reopens Sunday, January 11, 2026 @ 1PM. Spring Break: Closes Friday, February 27, 2026 @ 5PM & reopens Sunday, March 8, 2026 @ 1PM. End Of The Year: Closes Friday, May 1, 2026 @ 5PM.

Q: How am I notified about break closings and any expectations before I depart Curtis?

A: Beginning about three weeks ahead of each closing, Res Life will send out a weekly email about the upcoming break and any related expectations. In addition to the emails, notices are posted around Curtis and are also put up on the Yodeck TVs in Curtis & Alfond.

Q: What if I'm not able to leave until the day following the official closing of Curtis due to a ride/flight?

 $\underline{\Lambda}$: You can fill out a Late Departure Request to spend an extra night on campus. You will be on your own for dinner though, as the last meal served in the Mess Deck on a closing day is lunch.

Q: For the break closings, what if I need a ride to, and or from, Bangor for my flight/bus?

<u>A</u>: You'll need to fill out a Transportation Request, and Res Life coordinates transportation with a local taxi company. There is a cost for the taxi ride, which is divided among students in each taxi. Res Life tries to group as many students together for each taxi trip to keep the per-person cost as low as possible. As a result of this, sometimes students will arrive in Bangor a few hours before they need to be there and will have to wait around until their departure time. Res Life only coordinates taxi rides for breaks.

Curtis Hall Renovation

As you may already know, Curtis Hall is currently undergoing a major renovation. This project includes upgrades to the heating and plumbing systems, enhancements to the air handling system, a redesigned front lobby, and improvements to life safety features throughout the building.

The renovation will be completed in four phases. During each phase, one-quarter of the building will be offline. These phases have been carefully planned to ensure that students can remain in the same room for the duration of a semester, avoiding mid-semester room changes. However, in some cases, students will need to relocate rooms before heading out for winter break in December due to one phase wrapping up and the next beginning.

To maintain the same number of beds in Curtis Hall throughout the renovation, we have had to triple up some rooms. For example, if Phase 1 removes 100 beds from use, we must redistribute those 100 beds among the remaining areas (Phases 2, 3, and 4). We understand that having three students in a room is not ideal and recognize the potential stress this may cause.

While the renovation presents certain challenges, it is long overdue and will ultimately enhance the residential experience in Curtis Hall. With patience, understanding, and flexibility, we will successfully navigate this transition together.

The Student Activities team is comprised of Emily Berry, Assistant Director of Student Activities; and students who work as Campus Activities Board (CAB) members.

Some of the on-campus events CAB sponsored this past year included: jackpot BINGO, paint nights, stuff-a-bear, and Duck Day (an annual event where rubber duckies are hidden around campus - if you find a duck, you win a prize). Off-campus events included: rock climbing at Volta Climbing Gym in Trenton, trampoline park at Orono Trampoline Park in Orono, and an evening bioluminescence kayak trip with Castine Kayak Adventures in Castine.
