PRESS HERALD BUREAU WASHINGTON — The Maritime Administration's subsidy to students of Maine Maritime Academy and other state marine schools has been restored to an annual \$600 per cadet. Rep. P. N. Kyros was informed Thursday.

Kyros said the government had advised the Maine academy earlier this year that it planned to reduce the individual payments to \$500 because of insufficient federal funds. The congressman said this would have created a "serious problem."

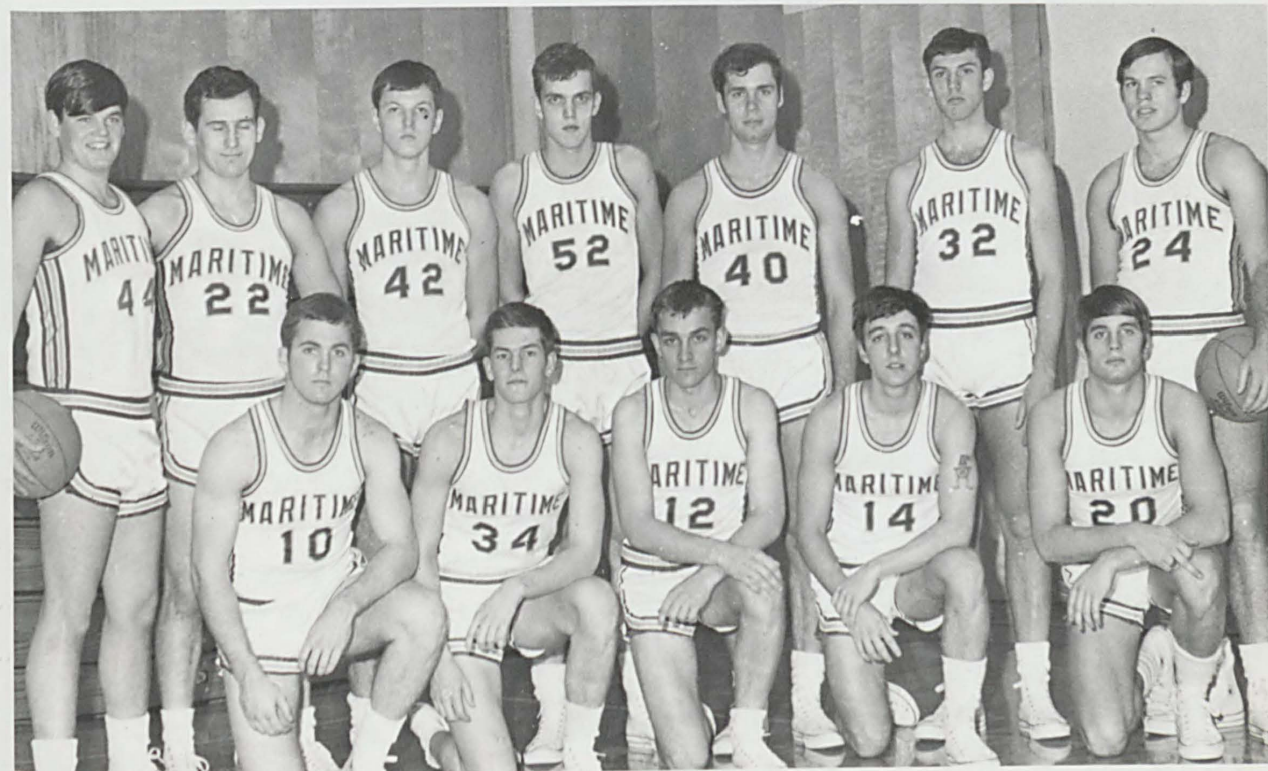
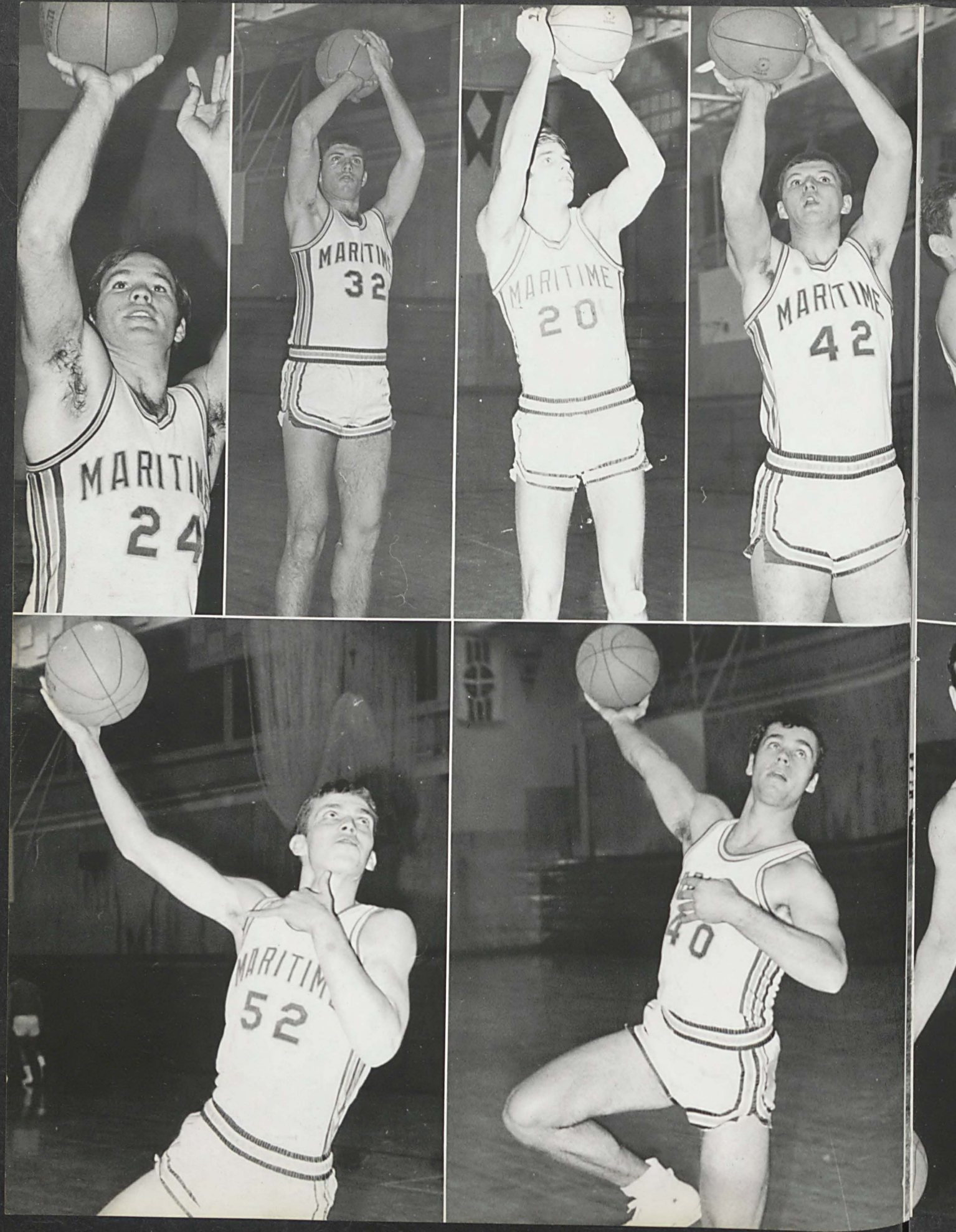
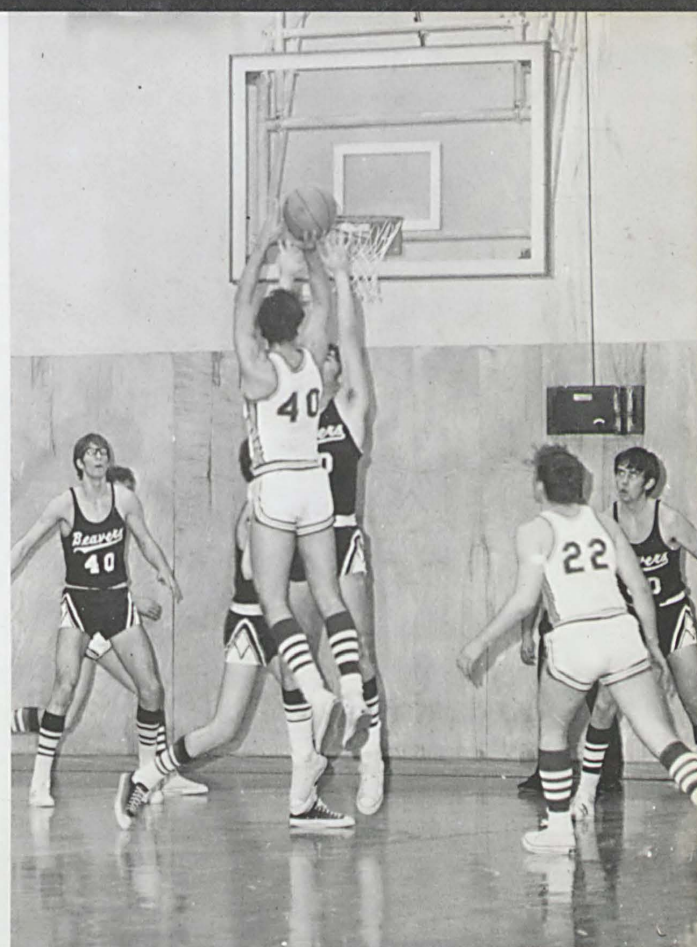
The 1970-71 Basketball Team had a very trying season. Their schedule was split in half because of the Academy's annual cruise in which all the senior and freshman players had to sail.
